CHAIR'S NOTICE

This week the United Tribes Technical College (UTTC) is hosting its 25th Annual Intertribal Leadership Summit in the Bismarck Event Center. 2022 marks the NIGC's first participation in the regular gathering and celebration whose attendees include Native students, tribal leaders and other government executives from across North Dakota and other parts of Indian country.

Today, September 7, 2022, I spoke to the Summit's attendees about the impact of a regulator's role on economic development in Indian country. Because lawmakers' public policy objectives and goals guide a gaming regulator's mission, Indian gaming's regulatory framework requires the NIGC to balance oversight with an eye towards improving tribal regulatory capacity, cultivating a sustainable and positive industry reputation, and supporting economic development with appropriate regulatory requirements.

My presentation included updates on a broad range of NIGC activity that exemplify how the Agency supports tribal economic development by evaluating risks to sound industry regulation, seeking efficiency and innovation in its regulatory tools, and providing certainty when possible for emerging gaming industry trends. I also summarized NIGC activity around the Agency's four focus areas: protecting integrity; promoting preparedness; ensuring accountability; and innovating outreach.
